NARCAN Nasal Spray is intended for immediate administration as emergency therapy in settings where opioids may be present.

This prescription product can be used on adults or children and is easily administered by anyone, even those without medical training. The drug is sprayed into one nostril while the patient is lying on his or her back, and can be repeated if necessary.

NARCAN Nasal Spray is not a substitute for emergency medical care.

Reducing Stigma

Stigma has the potential to negatively affect a person's self-esteem, damage relationships with loved ones, and prevent those suffering from addiction from accessing treatment. In order to encourage people to reach out for help and get on the path to recovery, it is important to reduce the stigma surrounding their situation.

Our non-stigmatizing approach provides the nonjudgmental, empathic support that is needed to those who begin their road to seek treatment for addiction.

Road to Recovery

Detox Services

To find detox services that help manage withdrawal symptoms, expect to call multiple locations in order to locate an available bed. The earlier you call, the better chance you will have of finding immediate assistance.

Transitional Support Services (TSS)

Short-term residential services are for people transitioning from detox to long-term recovery and support.

Long-Term Residential Treatment

For people who have completed detox, are medically stable, and able to participate in structured residential treatment. Treatment is approximately 30 days to 8 months.

Intensive Outpatient

For those who do not need a detox. Parttime, yet intensive treatment schedule outside of a residential treatment setting to accommodate work and family life.

Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)

Utilizes medication to treat substance use disorders (SUD) - more specifically cravings related to addiction/SUD.
